In this issue, I want to give everyone an update on the status of the special parking district for our community. The special parking district will prevent large trucks, trailers, RV's, and boats from parking on our streets for more than 2 days at a time. We are very close to getting all of the signatures needed to qualify for the parking dis-

trict. We have already gathered the required 60% of the community and have almost 51% of every block.

It has been a lot of work, since the Fairfax County Department of Transportation carved our neighborhood up into blocks of 5-10 houses. As of the last count, we needed about 6 more signatures in various parts of Armfield. We will be posting the addresses we need on our Facebook page as well as emailing them out. If your

house is on the list and you are willing to sign the petition, please let me know.

We have budgeted for a few major repairs this Spring. We will be fixing the large cracks in the Tennis courts and repainting them. We will also be repairing the surface of one of the basketball courts. If you have items you want us to consider for repairs in 2011, please send a note to president@armfieldfarm.org

Battery Disposal & Recycling (1-800-8-Battery)

Alkaline batteries - The everyday household batteries used in flashlights, remote controls, and other appliances. Labeled "alkaline," the size can be AA, AAA, 9v, D or C. Alkaline batteries may be disposed of safely in your household trash. This is because today's alkaline batteries have been re-engineered and reformulated to a very low toxicity.

Rechargeable batteries (*If you can recharge it - you can recycle it!*) - Rechargeable batteries are commonly found in cordless power tools, cellular and cordless phones, laptop computers, digital cameras, two-way radios, camcorders, and remote control toys. Labeled "rechargeable," the size can be AA, AAA, 9v, D, C or be specially designed for a particular device. Please recycle your rechargeable batteries at the Sully District Office at 4900 Stonecroft Blvd.

Button batteries - These small, round "button-cell" type batteries are found in items such as watches, hearing aids and some cameras. Residents may take their button batteries to the Household Hazardous Waste Facilities at the I-66 Transfer Station Complex at 4618 West Ox Road.

Warning Signs of Heart Attack During Winter Storm Cleanup

Stress and strenuous physical activity can increase the risk of heart attacks among those experiencing the impacts of a natural disaster. As Virginians cope with winter storms, the Virginian Department of Health asks those performing heavy physical activity to be aware of the warning signs of heart attacks.

While some heart attacks are sudden and intense, many heart attacks start slowly with mild pain or discomfort. If you or someone you are with begins to have chest discomfort, especially with one or more of the other signs of a heart attack, call 911 right away.

Warning Signs of a Heart Attack

Chest discomfort—Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes or that goes away and comes back. It can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.

Discomfort in other areas of the upper body—Symptoms can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.

Shortness of breath may occur with or without chest discomfort.

Other signs include breaking out in a **cold sweat**, **nausea** or **light-headedness**.

What to Do?

If you or someone you are with shows one or more of these signs, don't ignore them. Call 911 to get medical help right away. Calling 911 is almost always the fastest way to get life-saving treatment. Emergency medical services staff can begin treatment when they arrive, up to an hour sooner than if someone gets to the hospital by car. EMS personnel are also trained to revive someone whose heart has stopped. You'll also get treated faster in the hospital if you arrive by ambulance.

Spring Renovation Planning

The Architectural Review Board is an important part of our Homeowners Association. Their goal is to make sure our neighborhood is in line with HOA guidelines - so that we can keep up our home values and keep the community looking great. The ARB has been very busy this year working with homeowners on replacing garage doors (which need to match the original color or the home's



trim) and reviewing shed applications on a case-by-case basis.

If you are planning any renovations on your home's exterior this coming Spring, please plan ahead and contact the ARB via email (see page 8) and find out if you need to submit an application. It's better to be sure up front rather than gamble on having to fix things later!

If you are interested in volunteering for the HOA, the ARB is looking for new members to help out reviewing applications and/or taking over as ARB chair.

Snow Removal FAQ

Where do I call about getting my street plowed?

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) is responsible for plowing the public roads (interstate, primary, secondary, residential) in Fairfax County. Clearing is done on a priority basis, with interstates and high volume roads cleared first. Once the most heavily traveled roads and emergency routes are adequately clear, snow crews move to less-traveled roads and subdivisions. These public roadways can typically be identified by a route number sign posted at street intersections. 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Snow Removal FAQ Continued

What about snow removal on my pipestem driveway?

Pipestem driveways are privately owned and maintained by the property owners on the pipestem. Snow removal is the property owners' responsibility.

Who is responsible for clearing snow from the sidewalks in my neighborhood?

Neither the state nor the county clears snow and ice from public walkways (sidewalks and trails). While not legally obligated, residents and businesses are asked to help keep sidewalks safe. They should, as soon as feasible, clear snow off the sidewalks in front of their property so that all pedestrians, especially school children, those with disabilities, dog walkers and the elderly, may walk securely.
