President's Message

This is my first message to you as the new President of Armfield Farm Homeowners Association. Thanks to Dan Gordon for his tireless efforts as your President over the last two years as well as his 9 dedicated years as a board member. Dan, we all appreciate your

commitment to your community!

My primary goal as President this year is to dramatically increase communication throughout our community. The first step toward that goal is what you are reading right now. We have reestablished the Armfield Farm newsletter and will initially publish it quarterly, with monthly distribution being possible at a later date. The newsletter will be financially selfsufficient as a result of the newsletter committee's advertisement income. To save on the hefty postage costs of delivering a newsletter, we are establishing a team of block captains. Each block captain will ensure the prompt delivery of the newsletter (and directory, see below) as well as be an advocate for that area of our community. By receiving reports from the board and the committees as well as articles on other areas of interest, a newsletter is a great way to stay on top of what is going on in the community.

In addition to the newsletter, we have launched Armfield Farm's first official website: www.ArmfieldFarm.org. It is still in its infancy as we need to add scores of content, but our hope is that this website will be a fabulous source of information about current events in our community as well as pertinent information like ARC regulations, a map of the community, and specific contact information. When our build-out is complete, this website will be a valuable resource for all homeowners.

The last of the major communications efforts is to develop and publish a community directory. Plans are in process to begin the data collection for this fairly ambitious project. (Please see the related article in this newsletter). It is my hope that a directory will allow us to communicate more easily with our neighbors and

Past President's Message

Spring signals another seasonal change and the arrival of the Annual Meeting which was recently held at Franklin Middle School. I noticed quite a few new faces in attendance this year. My words this year are about the relentless march of change, but I thought I would look back and share some history regarding our neighborhood, Armfield Farm. Mr. Lockhart, a gentleman whom I met about six years ago, grew up on a few acres of land that sits adjacent to our community. In fact, he still lives on the same land, now enjoying his retirement years. He actually knew and worked as a teenager for the Armfields, the previous owners of the land on which our homeowner association now resides. I thought that I would share some of the tid-bits that he has told me in our several conversations over the years...

- ❖ The old house on Lees Corner Road, now part of the community off of Roger Mack Court and Lees Corner Road, was the original farmhouse of the Armfield Farm estate.
- ❖ The patriarch was J.B. Armfield.
- ❖ He had a daughter named Elizabeth Bokel, namesake of a street in our community.
- ❖ J.B. Armfields' grand-daughter also lived in that original farmhouse.
- ❖ The farm grew corn, hay, and red clover and had lots of cows.
- ❖ There were two tenement houses for the farm workers, near where the tennis courts are now located.
- ❖ The Virginia Beef Corporation rented this land from the Armfields for several years before the land was sold to developers.

My own personal memories of living here at Armfield Farm during these many years allow me to recall when the original Armfield Farm homestead had horses grazing on its property, when Beech Down Drive was originally a dead-end just south of Rosetree Court before Saville Chase was developed, when we used to have a guard's shack at the Springhaven Drive entrance, and when practically the only developments on Centreville Road between Rt. 50 and Frying Pan Road were Floris Elementary, the fire station, and the Frying Pan Meeting House.

I could elaborate more, but change and more change is inevitable. The only question is how fast it will come. Construction of another new residential development adjacent to our neighborhood will be commencing soon. The Ox Hill Development of Lowe Street has been 96% consolidated and, within the next year or so, yet another subdivision will be created that will share a property line with Armfield Farm.

Centreville Road Update

There will be a road improvement bond up for a vote during this November's election. Fairfax County hopes to raise \$50 million and match that with \$50 million in Federal funding. If the bond passes they will expand Centreville Road to four lanes starting at Metrotech drive and continuing up to McLaren Road, where it ties into an existing four lane roadway. There is no timeline for beginning the construction if the bond passes. The original plans for widening Centerville Road were drawn up many years ago and would need to be redone before any construction could begin.

Our HOA has been busy. Here are some of the many items that have been on our agenda the past two years:

- Design and creation of our new website! www.armfieldfarm.org
- ***** The Architectural Review Committee standards for sheds have been revised significantly.
- ❖ We are now in the process of revising and updating and improving the entire set of HOA Architectural standards.
- New park benches have been installed at our various tot-lots and the tennis courts.
- ❖ Additional wood carpet has been installed at tot-lots.
- ❖ Tennis courts have been completely resurfaced and painted.
- ❖ Basketball courts have been completely resurfaced and painted.
- A newly improved tennis court lock has been installed (so that you can't get locked in the tennis courts anymore!)
- Our pool parking lot has been re-sealed, re-striped and curbs painted.
- ❖ A new sign light was installed at the Bokel entrance sign.
- New ceiling fans, lights, and additional decorative painting have been installed throughout the pool house.
- ❖ Interior construction of a new 6x10 ft. storage room in the pool house is complete.
- ❖ A new audio PA system and speakers have been installed for the pool and volleyball court grounds.
- ❖ A monitored alarm system will soon be installed at the pool house.

I have thoroughly enjoyed making Armfield Farm my home and contributing to its future. I urge you to get involved in one of our several committees and to give your contribution of time and expertise, no matter how big or small, so that we continually improve our neighborhood.

Wouldn't it be great if there were someplace you could look up this information? An Armfield Farm Neighborhood Directory is the answer! A directory can contain all this information and more!

The Armfield Farm Communications Committee is kicking off the creation of a new neighborhood directory. The directory will be distributed to neighborhood residents and will also be available on the neighborhood password-protected website, www.armfieldfarm.org. The printed directory will be published every 2 to 3 years, while the website will be updated on a continuous basis.

In order for the directory to be most useful and complete, we would like to include the following information about each household:

- First and last names of adult residents
- Street Address
- Phone number
- Children's names and birth years
- Email address

The directory will also include a great deal of handy information such as:

- Listing of residents organized by Street
- ❖ Board member names and e-mail addresses
- Committee chairpersons and e-mail addresses
- ❖ Block Captains and contact information
- **❖** Area merchants
- Local churches
- Protective Covenants and Restrictions
- Neighborhood map
- Advertisements

With all that said, here's what you need to do. On the reverse side is the Armfield Directory Form that will be used to gather information for each household. Please read it over and include as much of the information as you choose. As a minimum, each resident's name and address will be printed in the directory - whether we receive a Directory Form or not. If you choose not to include any information about your household, you must opt out of the directory by signing and dating in the appropriate block on the Directory Form.

All forms must be submitted before October 30, 2004, for the proper information to be included in the first issue of the directory. For your convenience two collection boxes for the forms will be available; one at the pool (until Labor Day) and one at 13621 Clary Sage Drive. Forms can also be mailed to Annette Rhoads at 13621 Clary Sage Drive.

Please complete and submit your Directory Form as soon as possible. We are excited about putting together a directory that will be a valuable resource to our residents as well as a handy way for residents to get to know each other better!




