Around the community, the County completed most of their work on the storm water pond retrofit near Beech Down and Bellerose. The fencing will stay up until the final tree plantings are done, which are expected to happen soon. In other common areas,

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our landscaping contractor will soon be addressing some problem areas that have been on our list to tackle for a while. We appreciate all of our residents' patience.

Unfortunately, we did not get to two projects on our list yet- additional pool shade and bas-

ketball court fencing. We got caught up in a very complex and unexpected permitting process with the County. We are very close to getting the permits through and plan to install the shade structure this fall so it will be ready to go in the spring. We will be including the basketball fencing in next year's budget and will install that in spring.

at 1pm. We will meet at the pool house and gloves, bags and some yummy treats will be provided to our volunteers. If your children need service hours, we will be happy to sign for them!

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
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We are also working to see whether Santa will be coming on his fire truck in mid-December. Keep being on the 'nice' list and watch the signboards for the event details.



Home Maintenance

One might think that the Fall issue might be an odd time to discuss home maintenance as we tend to hunker down in our homes waiting for 'old man' winter to arrive and pass over us. But as we (hopefully) spend the time to rake up fallen leaves off the lawn, Fall is a welcome time to take an opportunity to look at our (most likely) prized material possession and see where it is aligned with our respective visions and community standards. Publications like US News & World Report, Money Matters, Main Street, and others advise planning to spend 1-5% of your homes value (or for our area approximately \$5,000-25,000 a year) on maintenance and improvements.

Homeowners associations operate across a spectrum of management and enforcement from the extremely lax to those having very strict covenants. The Armfield Farm HOA has very few matters that rise to a level of enforcement. Many issues where an owner is unaligned with the Guidelines are resolved with a reminder of the forgotten covenant. Below are some of the most significant and most frequent concerns:

- 1) **Failing to file an application for a change.** Most things are approvable, but just need to be noted in the HOA records for the future sale of your home. If in doubt, e-mail arb@armfieldfarm.org.
- 2) Driveways and sheds. If you have a one car garage and one car apron, the driveway should not be widened to park two cars side by side. Storage sheds are permitted in very limited circumstances with an application. Having to remove an unapproved widened driveway or shed can be very costly.
- 3) **Yard maintenance.** Look to see if you have trees or shrubs impeding use of the sidewalk; gardening areas where weeds are indistinguishable from plantings; or plant life growing into the siding.
- 4) **Tree removal.** Sometimes its necessary for the health of the surrounding area to take a tree down. If the tree stump is not removed, it must be ground down to the level of the surrounding area.
- 5) **General maintenance.** Trash/recycling cans should be behind the house in an enclosed areas (garage) on non-collection days. Trim color changes require an application and painted trim/fascia should not be peeling or molding.
- 6) **Rentals.** Owners who rent out their homes are required to file a current copy of the lease with the HOA. This allows any concerns or important information to get to the owner quickly.



Treasurer's Report

As mentioned in my last Treasurer's report, 2014 was the year of small projects and gathering quotes for larger future projects. This year we re-sealed the pool parking lot, repaired the roof of the Bokel Entrance wishing well, removed the hazardous "merry-go-round" playground in the center of the community, added mulch to the playgrounds, re-placed the old wooden picnic tables at the pool, ordered soccer goals to be installed near the Clary Sage ball-field and have put in an order for new signage at the Spring-haven entrance. The amount of energy that these small projects demanded was actually quite surprising.

While we were focused on those many other tasks, we were unfortunately unable to get quotes for replacing the basketball court fencing, which will be pushed to 2015. However the Board decided to shift the freed up funds to purchase an additional sign for the Springhaven entrance so that our name can be seen on both sides of the street. Look for them to be installed sometime this October. We will continue with more signs along Lees Corner in 2015.

Because the masonry for the Springhaven entrance extends 30' in width, the Board decided to go with a 10' wide by 30" tall rectangular sign, with a deep pine-sap green back-



ground and cream lettering. We will fill in some of the empty space with bushes and greenery. The Board relied on last year's survey results and an on-site visit with samples of three coloring alternatives to come up with the final design - high contrast with a natural tone. We are looking forward to seeing the results.

I should also touch upon the community improvement that had the Board very excited this Spring. Last October we authorized the purchase of a new shade structure that would cantilever over the tables along the fence line near the volleyball net. The materials have been in a warehouse nearby since March, but unfortunately Fairfax County put us through the bureaucratic ringer with bizarre health reviews of the pool and so many nonapplicable permitting delays that the installation has now been delayed over six months.


Hopefully, we will be able to install it before the year is out.

Looking toward next year, we have finalized our capital improvement plans: \$25k for the path replacements as mentioned on page 8 (with one additional area to be determined), new fencing for all basketball courts (\$16k), full refurbishment of the volleyball court with sand replacement, drainage & new post system (\$30k), additional entrance signs on Lees Corner (\$5-9k per sign), crack repair and resurfacing of the tennis courts (\$15k) and possibly some renovations to the sinks in the pool house. Items that we are considering for 2016 include: improved lighting for the tennis courts (~\$20k-\$40k), new pool furniture (\$30k), new backstops for the basketball courts (~\$5k per court) and replacing more of the paths. We will be sending out another survey this Spring to check in with the community on their preferences and help us with next year's NEPP application.

Armfield Farm Selected Again for NEPP Grant

In September, Fairfax County awarded Armfield Farm \$5,000 towards its walking path replacement effort as part of the Neighborhood Enhancement Partnership Program (NEPP). This is the third year of the past four that we have received this grant. The planned path replacements for 2015 include: 1) extending a pathway towards from Springhaven Drive toward Chantilly Road to connect a basketball court and tot lot to the network of walking paths (and paving over deep bicycle ruts), 2) replacing the deteriorated paths connecting this new path to Beech Down and Springhaven Drives (where large gaps catch strollers and small bicycle wheels causing injury), and 3) adding a short extension to connect the Dragon playground with the walking path network reducing the impact of an area drainage problem.


For those not familiar with the NEPP, the goals of the program are to promote healthier, safer and cleaner neighborhoods; enhance neighborhood appearance; encourage or create a culture of engagement, including facilitating communication and connections in neighborhoods between individuals, youth, and families; and build or nurture community leadership within a neighborhood. These funds do come with conditions. We have to use the funding for the walking path replacement we requested and the project has to be complete by September 2015. Additionally, as part of the grant, we will have to provide 51 community service hours. This can take place specific to the area of construction or in the surrounding areas of the community. Please look for messages from the Social committee for these opportunities and volunteer your time along with your other ideas for community service projects. Service hour credit is available for those who have school or scouting requirements.

Gas Mantles

As the daylight gets shorter, it's important to check that your lamp posts are functioning correctly. Many of the gas lamp posts in our neighborhood have one or more of the mantles missing. Our ARB guidelines require them both to be lit or the light be converted to electricity with a sensor to turn it on automatically at night. In order to help residents ob-



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tain the mantles,

we have purchased a stock of them and our management company will resell them at cost. Federal Election and Ballot Initiative Information



On November 4th House, US Senate, one Virginia constitutional amendment, and one bond issue will be up for ballot. Our polling

place will be at Lees Corner Elementary located at 13500 Hollinger Avenue.

This is the first election where new Voter ID laws will be in effect. Acceptable ID include an employee ID card, a drivers license, military ID, passport, of student ID by a Virginia school. If one does not have a valid ID, free voter IDs are available. Voter ID information can be found at http://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/elections.

Registration to vote ends on October 14th.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment

Shall Section 6-A of Article X (Taxation and Finance) of the Constitution of Virginia be amended to allow the General Assembly to exempt from taxation the real property of the surviving spouse of any member of the armed forces of the United States who was killed in action, where the surviving spouse occupies the real property of his or her principal place of residence and has not remarried?

Shall the Board of Supervisors contract a debt, borrow money and issue bonds of Fairfax County, Virginia, in addition to bonds previously authorized for transportation improvements and facilities. in the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$100,000,000 for the purpose of providing funds to finance the cost of constructing, reconstructing, improving and acquiring transportation facilities, including improvements to primary and secondary State highways, improvements related to transit, improvements for pedestrians and bicycles, and ancillary related improvements and facilities?
